Lead exposure in children can cause:

- Damage to the brain and nervous system.
- Slowed growth and development.
- Learning and behavior problems.
- Hearing and speech problems.

This can cause:

- Lower IQ.
- Decreased ability to pay attention.
- Underperformance in school.



Governor DeWine:

"Every child in Ohio deserves to live a fulfilling life where they have the opportunity to reach their God-given potential."







Key Recommendation:

Adopt CDC's blood lead reference value of $3.5 \mu g/dL$.

- Ohio Administrative Code rule changes effective July 1, 2023.
- Changes align Ohio with the CDC Blood Lead Reference Value.
- Public health actions for EBLL cases commenced July 1, 2023.



Enhanced Services

- A home visit by a public health professional and education about lead exposure.
- Awareness of environmental intervention options available from local, state, and federal lead hazard control and rehabilitation programs.
- Links to the Lead Abatement Tax Credit Program, early intervention services, Help Me Grow programs, and other resources.



Families Reached

~ 1,500

These are families who were previously ineligible for these services.



Workforce – Lead Abatement Workers

• Reduced training hours to 16, down from 24.

• ODH subsidizes training, licensure, exam fees.



Workforce Growth

Result: 16% increase in workforce since 2023!

> 1,500 individuals today



Abating Lead

• Grants offered through the **Ohio Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program.**


•Typical grant, on average = \$30,000.



Lead Poisoned Child Referrals

- 10μg/dL or greater results.
 - Cases in this range are known as lead poisoned child cases.
 - Childhood Lead Exposure Questionnaire.
 - Onsite Lead Inspection/Risk Assessment (LIRA).
 - Public Health Lead Investigator will respond to these cases.







Elevated Blood Lead Level Cases

Ohio has 85% case completion rate!

Lead-Safe Definition

The Ohio Housing Locator collaboration is committed to increasing access and awareness of lead-safe housing.

Ohio Lead-Safe/Free Registry

Lead has been used for many years in products found in and around our homes. Many homes built before 1978 have lead-based paint.

The owner or agent of the residential rental unit may register the rental unit on the lead-safe residential rental unit registry. Documentation must be provided by the owner or agent to identify all or some units/buildings that are lead-safe. Lead-safe certification is in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code, 3701-81.

Searching for Lead-Safe Housing as easy as 1-2-3!

Step 1: Click on the "Find Lead-Safe Housing" box above.

Step 2: Type a city, county, or ZIP Code into the "Find your new home" bar and click the magnifying glass -OR- choose an area to search from the list of counties and cities.

Step 3: Sort through results or further refine the search as needed.

Search Tips: Do you see housing listings? If you see housing listings, there are 30 or fewer listings in the area you are searching.



Ohio Lead Safe Housing Fund (LSHF)

- General Revenue Fund (GRF) and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding for local high-risk communities.
- Funding dedicated to childhood lead poisoning prevention activities in high-risk zip codes.
- Fifteen local subrecipients were selected in a competitive bid process. Working on 16 total projects.
- Contracts awarded in November 2023.


Lead poisoning prevention marketing, education/outreach, physician education.

Coordinating ODH funds with local housing grants (HUD, CDBG).



House Bill 45 – Coronavirus State and Local Recovery Funds

- Also known as American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.
- \$150 million allocated to the Ohio Department of Development (ODOD).
- \$20 million set aside for ODH.
- Funds to support:
 - Lead-safe building certification.
 - Screening and testing for lead poisoning.
 - o Education and community engagement.
 - o Early intervention for children and families impacted by lead.



ODH ARPA Funding

• Funding must be encumbered by September 30, 2024.

 Collaboration with ODOD and Office of Budget and Management.

• \$17 million of \$20 million encumbered as of March 31, 2024.



ODH ARPA Funding Examples

- Examples of funded projects include:
 - Local lead renovation projects.
 - Distribution of cleaning kits and High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) vacuums.
 - Statewide marketing campaign.
 - Statewide distribution of storyboard books.
 - Health equity projects.










We covered chipping paint so that it couldn't shed.





Look at lead-free met

Look at lead-free mel



My parents put a filter on the kitchen sink. That cleans the water before we eat or drink

Look af lead-free mel



We find lead-free products at the grocery store.
This includes spices, makeup, and more!

We use only lead-free pans and pots. This helps my development a lot.

Mom's always mopping and putting the shoes away.

That keeps the lead from outside at bay.

When I go to the doctor, I get poked. That's the only way lead poisoning is diagnosed.





Do's

moving in.

- If you might be exposed at work, change clothes and clean up before going home (including underwear, hats, and cell phones).
- Put a water filter on the kitchen faucet to keep the water you drink and cook with lead-free!
- Use only lead-free cultural powders, spices and seasonings.
- Use only lead-free cooking pots & pans, including aluminum pans.
- Cover any areas of chipping/peeling paint immediately and fix them ASAP.
- Clean the horizontal surfaces in your home with a damp mop at least 1x/week.
- Leave your shoes at the door.
- Keep bare soil in the yard covered with mulch or grass and grow vegetables in a raised bed more than 10 feet from your home.

Don'ts

- Don't let your child put paint chips or dust in their mouth.
- Don't grow vegetables in the ground near pre-1978 housing.
- Don't assume that cultural powders, spices, and seasonings are lead-free.
- Don't wear shoes from outside into your home.
